


Public schools are the cornerstone of our communities. We welcome students of all backgrounds, abilities, and incomes. We each play a role in ensuring our schools are open to all.


During American Education Week, we celebrate public education and show our appreciation for the men and women who make a difference in students' lives every day.

Thank you to Roger Bohringer and Ultimate Entertainment for your services in making this a special experience. Huge shout out to Janet Lathrop for the wonderful meals.





MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS



They played 'Sweet Child O' Mine' and 'All Along the Watchtower', and also got to jam with other students during downtime!



NOTES FROM THE NURSE

- INFLUENZA VACCINATIONS AT SCHOOL: School-aged students were able to receive the influenza vaccination at school from Grant County Health Department with parent/guardian consent on October 20th. Consent (permission) forms were sent home with all students in grades ECH through 12, along with a Skylert message, to notify parents of this opportunity and of the need to return the consent form. Only one dose was given at school this fall. If your child requires a 2nd dose, you will need to obtain that dose on your own through the health department or your child's doctor/health care provider. Only flu *injections were available for students*.

VAPING



What's the Bottom Line on the Risks of E-cigarettes for Kids, Teens, and Young Adults?

- ~ The use of e-cigarettes is unsafe for kids, teens, and young adults.
- ~ Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine. Nicotine is highly addictive and can harm adolescent brain development, which continues into the early to mid-20s.
- ~ E-cigarettes can contain other harmful substances besides nicotine.
- ~ Young people who use e-cigarettes may be more likely to smoke cigarettes in the future.

Why Is Nicotine Unsafe for Kids, Teens, and Young Adults?

- ~ Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine—the addictive drug in regular cigarettes, cigars, and other} tobacco products.
- ~ A recent CDC study found that 99% of the e-cigarettes sold in assessed venues in the United States contained nicotine.
- ~ Some e-cigarette labels do not disclose that they contain nicotine, and some e-cigarettes marketed as containing 0% nicotine have been found to contain nicotine.
- ~ Nicotine can harm the developing adolescent brain. The brain keeps developing until about age 25.
 - * Using nicotine in adolescence can harm the parts of the brain that control attention, learning, mood, and impulse control.
 - * Each time a new memory is created or a new skill is learned, stronger connections – or synapses – are built between brain cells. Young people's brains build synapses faster than adult brains. Nicotine changes the way these synapses are formed.
- ~ Using nicotine in adolescence may also increase risk for future addiction to other drugs.

What Is in E-cigarette Aerosol?

- ~ E-cigarette aerosol is NOT harmless “water vapor.”
- ~ The e-cigarette aerosol that users breathe from the device and exhale can contain harmful and potentially harmful substances, including:
 - * Nicotine
 - * Ultrafine particles that can be inhaled deep into the lungs
 - * Flavorings such as diacetyl, a chemical linked to a serious lung disease
 - * Volatile organic compounds
 - * Cancer-causing chemicals
 - * Heavy metals such as nickel, tin, and lead¹
- ~ The aerosol that users inhale and exhale from e-cigarettes can expose both themselves and bystanders to harmful substances.
- ~ It is difficult for consumers to know what e-cigarette products contain. For example, some e-cigarettes marketed as containing zero percent nicotine have been found to contain nicotine.



BRINGING SUBSTANCES TO SCHOOL: In the past, there have been incidents where students have brought items such as mouth/breath spray and body spray to school. Because these items can be dangerous when used inappropriately and because of the potential for an allergic reaction, the school suggests that items such as these NOT be brought to school. Due to allergies and the potential for allergic reactions, food items brought to school should not be out of their containers except in the classroom (under the direction of staff) or at mealtime. Thank you for your assistance with this matter.

MEDICATIONS AT SCHOOL: All medications (other than medications *with prior approval*, such as rescue medications or things such as lip balm) must be secured (typically in the nursing office) at school, and ALL medications require consents. This includes lip balm, sunscreen, bug spray, cough drops, etc.

Consents must be completed for both over-the-counter (non-prescription) medications and for prescription medications (including inhalers). Prescription consents require the prescriber’s signature in addition to the parent/guardian’s signature. All medications must come to school in the original packaging and dosing must be per label/package directions. Dosing other than package instructions will require a medical provider signature. The school does not furnish any over-the-counter medications for students. You may call me or check the August/September newsletter for a medication consent form.




COVID-19: Taking steps to control the spread of COVID-19 is important, especially to make sure hospitals have the capacity to provide the full range of health care. In addition, many people, particularly older adults, and people with underlying health conditions, remain at risk of serious illness, hospitalization, and death.

In addition, DHS urges all Wisconsinites to take the following actions:

- ~ **Know the COVID-19 Community Level** where you live or are traveling to and follow the associated guidelines.
- ~ **Stay up to date on COVID-19 vaccines** by getting all recommended vaccines and booster doses.
- ~ **Get tested for COVID-19** if you have symptoms or were exposed to someone with COVID-19. Self-tests can be purchased at local pharmacy or retail stores, and each U.S. household is eligible to receive eight sets of free COVID-19 self-tests at [COVID.gov](https://www.covid.gov). In addition to at-home self-tests, community testing sites remain accessible across Wisconsin. Find a site near you by dialing 211 or visiting the [DHS Community Testing](#) information page.
- ~ **Stay home if you are sick or test positive for COVID-19** and talk to a health care provider or visit a community clinic to ask about available [treatments](#). For free, confidential assistance finding a doctor or community clinic near you, dial 211.

I lost my vaccination card... Where can I find my COVID-19 Vaccine Record?



- 1 If you were vaccinated in Wisconsin, visit the **Wisconsin Immunization Registry (WIR)**. Families and individuals can use WIR to view and print their immunization records. You will need your social security number, Medicaid ID, or a Health Care Member ID to get your records in WIR.
- 2 If you do not have that information, call the organization where you were vaccinated. They may be able to give you a new vaccination card or provide you with your Member ID number to use in WIR.
- 3 If these options don't work for you, fill out the **Wisconsin Immunization Registry Record Release Authorization** to gain access to your records in WIR.

If you received your vaccination in another state, go to that state department of health's website to search their vaccine registry.
