
Steppin' Out in Pink for Breast Cancer



Assessment News



Test date: March 12, 2024

All juniors will be taking the ACT at the high school. There is no registration necessary, this will all be taken care of by the school.

For those interested in doing a retake you can register online for the ACT at www.actstudent.org.

Free ACT Test Preparation Resources:

ACT is now offering a free online test prep. This can be accessed at https://academy.act.org/.

- Know exactly what you missed and what you didn't with a score report
- Access related resources to improve your skills based on what you missed
- Retake the test as many times as you want

Students, teachers, and parents can create an account. This account allows students to track their progress and keep moving forward in their test preparation. Short guizzes are designed to help students identify the content they have mastered and to clarify areas where more focus is needed. If students have already taken the ACT or PreACT they can simply enter their scores and custom playlists will be automatically created. 2023-24 Information for Families

What are the ACT High School Assessments?



ACT, Inc. has provided testing services for more than 50 years. Their assessments have evolved to reflect the nation's view of education to embrace lifelong learning and prepare students to be college and career ready after high school graduation. The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) contracted with ACT, Inc. starting with the 2014-15 fiscal year to

How are the test results used?

All students in grades 9-11 will be given these assessments except for approximately 1% of students with significant cognitive disabilities who will be tested with an alternate assessment. This system of assessments will allow teachers to measure a student's growth throughout high school. comprehensively assess Wisconsin high school students:

- 9th and 10th grade students will take the PreACT Secure assessment in the spring.
- 11th grade students will take The ACT® with writing in the spring.

The PreACT Secure

PreACT Secure assesses student readiness in English, Mathematics, Reading and Science.

The ACT® with writing

The ACT with writing consists of four multiplechoice tests: English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science; and a 40-minute essay test that measures student writing skills.

DPI will also use The ACT® with writing for the high school accountability measure in order to determine the extent to which schools and districts across the state meet proficiency standards.

What type of scores will be provided?

PreACT Secure scores are reported on a twodigit scale, 1 to 36, with 35 being the highest score. These scores will predict future ACT scores.

The ACT ® with writing scores range from 1 to 36 for each of the subtests and one overall score called a composite. Students will also receive a writing score ranging from 2 to 12. Scores can be used by students for college admission, scholarships, course placement,



and NCAA eligibility. Students have the option to send their scores to up to four colleges free of charge, complete a voluntary pre-test survey, and opt-in to having ACT provide their information to colleges. universities, financial aid and scholarship agencies, and organizations that provide educational programs.

Each ACT score will fall in one of four Wisconsin performance levels which defines the student's understanding and ability to apply grade-level knowledge and skills.

What learning standards do the ACT High School Assessments

measure?

ACT and DPI work together to ensure that the ACT assessments measure what students have learned through the Wisconsin Academic Standards. Students taught to the Wisconsin Academic Standards should be well prepared to be successful with the ACT assessments.

The Wisconsin Academic Standards define the knowledge and skills students should take away from their K-12 schooling to be successfully prepared for postsecondary and

career opportunities. The Wisconsin Academic Standards are available at http://dpi.wi.gov/standards.



February Newsletter Notes from the Nurse

<u>IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS</u>: The Wisconsin Student Immunization Law requires **one dose of Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and acellular pertussis) vaccine for students entering grades 7-12.** This



means that 6th grade students will be due for a Tdap vaccination when entering 7th grade. The county health department does not offer this vaccination at school, so please be sure to have your 6th graders vaccinated before the start of 7th grade. Those that qualify can schedule the vaccination through Grant County Health Department by calling 608-723-6461. Otherwise, contact your child's primary health care provider.

<u>BLOOD PRESSURE SCREENINGS FOR 10TH GRADERS</u>: 10th grade students have their blood pressure screened mid-winter. Hypertension, or high blood pressure, can be a silent but serious medical concern that is treatable once it is detected. If your child's blood pressure requires additional evaluation, you will receive a referral letter in the mail.





HEAD LICE:

Head lice is an ongoing problem through the school year. This is a reminder that it is important for parents to be screening their child (ren) for the presence of head lice. To detect the presence of head lice early, we suggest checking your family members' heads on a weekly basis. This is done by parting the hair in small sections with a comb and looking for bite marks, redness, or nits (eggs). The nits are usually found about ¹/₄ to 2 inches from the scalp. They adhere themselves onto the hair shaft and cannot be easily removed. The louse is a small flat, wingless, brownish-gray creature with stubby antennae and six legs each ending in a sharp curved claw. They are mostly found behind the

ears and at the nape of the neck, although they may be found anywhere on the head. The louse can be seen with the naked eye. They range in size and can be very tiny when first hatched. A thorough check for lice should take 15 minutes or more to do and must be done in a good light. It is best for everyone to use only their own personal articles at home and school. If evidence of active head lice is found, treatment with anti-lice shampoo is recommended. For more information regarding head lice detection and treatment, contact Grant County Health Department at 723-6416. Another resource for head lice evaluation and treatment is the Lice Clinic of America. You can contact the Dubuque, IA clinic by calling 563-235-1178 or check out their website at https://www.liceclinicsofamerica.com/landing/dubuque/. They do charge for their services but can sometimes bill insurance. You can also check with your health care provider, especially since some insurances will pay for specific head lice treatments.

Please note the district's procedure for management of head lice.

- 1. Students with live head lice, verified by inspection, will be sent home from school for treatment.
- 2. Repeat cases of live lice will not be readmitted to school. The school nurse will not medically excuse recurring or inadequately treated cases. (The parent/guardian will be responsible for absences related to untreated or inadequately treated cases. These absences could result in truancy.) Students may be rechecked by school staff to rule out continued or recurring infestation.
- 3. Classroom notification letters will be sent home to alert parents only if a high percentage of children in a classroom are newly infested (no history of head lice).
- 4. Schools will not perform mass head lice screenings, but will screen on an individual basis by referral. Typically, siblings living in the same household and known close contacts/friends in school will be screened when possible.

NATIONAL CHILDREN'S DENTAL HEALTH MONTH: February is National Children's Dental Health Month. The school nurse meets with our 1st graders each year to talk about healthy smiles, daily brushing, flossing, and healthy eating habits. You can help your child enjoy a lifetime of healthy smiles by encouraging good dental health habits and scheduling regular dental exams. Below are some "healthy teeth rules."

- Brush your teeth twice daily using a toothbrush with soft bristles and a pea-size amount of toothpaste
- Floss (with an adult's assistance if necessary) once daily
- Drink fluoridated water and/or participate in some sort of fluoride application/ supplement
- Eat a nutritious, balanced diet with plenty of healthy fluids and limit sugar and starch snacks
- Receive regular dental checkups

<u>DENTAL CARE AT SCHOOL</u>: *Teeth-For-Life* offers preventative dental care at school for all students in early childhood through 12th grade. A dental provider comes to the school to provide the program at no charge to you. All procedures will follow recommendations from the American Dental Association and Center for Disease Control and Prevention's recommendations for school-based dental sealant programs. This program provides our school with a visiting registered dental hygienist. Her name is Devan Toberman.

Professional dental services provided at school include:


- Dental health assessment
- Sealants (if appropriate)
- Fluoride varnish application
- Oral Health Education (with new toothbrush)
- Referral Assistance

Services do NOT include a dental exam or dental x-rays, therefore a visit to a dentist at least once a year is recommended. You will need to sign a permission form if you want your child to see the hygienist at school. If you would like a form, please contact the school nurse.



Facilities Referendum Update

Over the last many months, the district and its design and construction partners have been hard at work on the design phases, which wrapped up at the end of 2023. Thank you to the many staff and key stakeholders who were a part of the design process providing input and feedback on staff needs and design elements. We are currently in the construction planning phase (procurement). We had a great turnout from our open bidding process and from there we selected contractors that were the best fit for our district based on price and qualifications. Construction is scheduled to begin in the spring of 2024 when the ground thaws and will be complete by the fall of 2025.

Design & Construction Schedule



Phase One of the Long-Range Master Plan:

- » Address priority district-wide maintenance needs, including interior finishes, building envelope, and fire alarm upgrades
- » Add 4th and 5th-grade classrooms, flex space, parent drop-off, and secure entrances
- » Add bus loop, play area, additional parking, and ADA parking
- » Add gym and locker rooms for physical education, athletics, and community use
- >> Create operational and staff efficiencies by moving the district office to the Middle-High School building (using Fund 46 savings)
